### **Civic Center March 9, 2017**

  - A. Updating the Flood Plan Ordinance was tabled until the April meeting.
  - B. Linda Ferreri asked council to reexamine her water bill and refund charges associated with her husband obtaining a fire hose and filling their pond with water. Ferreri did not believe her husband's, Dan Kumler, actions resulted in the drop in water pressure resulting in the town needing to issue boil water notices. She apologized for any inconveniences and stated nothing like this would happen again and characterized the incident as gross miscommunication. Kingsley responded that the bill reflected the cost that taxpayers incurred as a result of Kumler's actions. "We billed you to have the water tested and the extra time employees spent correcting the draining of the tank." Callahan referenced a memo from the town's water operating company, Two Fold Engineering, which stated the average water flow

was 63,527 gallons per day. On Dec. 19<sup>th</sup> the flow was 138,000 gallons. “There was a huge difference in flow due to someone hooking into one of the town’s fire hydrants,” Callahan stated. Council denied the request to reduce the charges on the water bill.
